Outline: Recap Points to Ponder Questions to draw out understanding.

REFLECT

To be known is to be clearly recognized and understood. There are seasons in our lives when we can be in a crowded room and still feel unknown and misunderstood. Psalms 139 teaches us that no matter where we are, there is a God who intricately knows us. There is no place we can go, there is no thought we can have, there is no struggle that we face that God doesn't intricately see and know. May the simple truths from today's message inspire you to live a life On Demand in understanding who God is, what He's doing, and His perfect plans for your life.

REALIZE

1. You are Intricately known

- Scripture Reference; Psalms 139:1-12
- Questions for Reflection
 - Share about a season of testing that you went through and came out knowing the Lord in a more personal way. What did you learn from that season that taught you more about yourself and more about Christ?

2. God wants you to intricately know Him

- Scripture Reference; Psalms 139:1-12; Hebrews 4:13; Psalms 139:13-18
- Questions for Reflection
 - Where have you allowed the voice of the culture, family, or a leader to speak louder than the voice of God?
 - How can you redirect yourself back to Him?

3. Respond in Prayer and Surrender

- Scripture Reference; Psalms 139:1-12; John 1:1; John 10:4-5; Psalms 139:23-24
- Questions for Reflection
 - Is there an area of your life that you are trying to lead in and God is asking you to surrender to Him? Share practical things that you plan on doing to help you maintain a heart of surrender as you trust God to direct your steps.

Optional Follow-up Questions:

- What makes you say that?
- How do you feel about that?
- How would you explain your answer to a non-Christian friend or neighbor?
- Why did God design it to work that way? Why not just do (whatever else) instead?
- What would you say to someone who disagrees with that?
- Why do we really have to do it like that? Why can't we just go (some other route) instead?
