Outline: Recap Points to Ponder Questions to draw out understanding.

REFLECT

As we continue our series unpacking the Miracles of Jesus, today's message will reveal His radical response to desperate faith. We learn that it's not the size of our faith that moves mountains but the intention behind Who our faith is in. When we put our faith and trust in Jesus, we recognize that He restores what is broken, His love knows no end, and even our smallest step of sincerely seeking Him can lead to some of the greatest miracles. Join us as we look at how the journey of walking with Jesus can lead us from fearful to faith-full.

REALIZE

- 1. No one is exempt from suffering...
 - Scripture Reference: Mark 5:21-43
 - Questions for Reflection
 - Share a time in your life when you faced suffering or hardship. How did you respond to it?
- 2. Suffering should turn us to Jesus
 - Scripture Reference: Mark 5:21-43, Proverbs 18:10
 - Questions for Reflection
 - What did you learn about yourself and/or God during that time of suffering?
- 3. Confess and be Made Well
 - Scripture Reference: Mark 5:21-43, James 5:16
 - Questions for Reflection
 - What does your practice of confession currently look like in your life? Share a time where faith and confession led to healing—whether emotional, physical, or spiritual.
 - Take time to openly confess to one another and then pray for one another's needs.
- 4. Stop fearing, keep on believing
 - Scripture Reference: Mark 5:21-43
 - Questions for Reflection
 - What would it practically look like for you to "Stop fearing and keep on believing?" How can your small group keep you accountable with this?

Optional Follow-up Questions:

- What makes you say that?
- How do you feel about that?
- How would you explain your answer to a non-Christian friend or neighbor?
- Why did God design it to work that way? Why not just do (whatever else) instead?
- What would you say to someone who disagrees with that?
- Why do we really have to do it like that? Why can't we just go (some other route) instead?
